Monday of the Second Week of Advent

The doctrine concerning the Immaculate Conception has been in existence since the seventh century in the East and ninth century in the West. There were some opponents to the doctrine because they said it detracted from the truth of her natural conception. Her parents Anne and Joachim are both saints and we have a church at Westby named after Mary's mother. Many hymns have been written in honour of our Lady and the words 'the one spotless womb wherein Jesus was lay. (O purest of creatures by Frederick William Faber) spring to mind. We have a lot to thank our Lady for because her 'Yes' opened the world to salvation.

The programme has shown the triumphs of farming and it has also shown the tragedies which they take seriously but philosophically.

Our gospel tells us about a man who has a hundred sheep and one strays away. It is amazing that he knows that one has gone off. I am sure the same applies to today's stockspeople. The man has a dilemma: does he go in search and risk more going astray or does he stay put with the ninety nine? Our Lord gives us an 'if'. If he finds the sheep the man will be more joyous over that than the rest staying put.

God doesn't want anybody to get lost or go astray. It is hard for us to imagine but when we think of people of notoriety we probably don't consider what God thinks. From this gospel it is plain to see that God wants us all to stay in the flock.

Friday of the Second Week of Advent

Self

Is it selfish to think about yourself? Now there's a question to set the mind running. We think about ourselves everyday. Am I going to get up, what am I going to wear, what should I have to eat, what am I doing today? All legitimate questions and not much chance for being selfish unless you take the last slice of bread or whatever. We have to love ourselves because if we

don't then we have no chance of obeying what Jesus said about loving our neighbour as ourself.

The trouble starts to appear when we want everything for ourself and it doesn't mattter the cost to other people. In this instance Greed starts to rear its ugly head. There is also the danger that we might claim everything as being done by us. Look at my work and see how superior it is to everybody else's. This is Pride starting to take shape. It is right to be proud of how we have used our talents. But to crow it over other people is not good. We give thanks for the gifts that we have been given and as some of us had instilled to us it is A.M.D.G. for the greater glory of God that we use these talents and shun pride and greed.

Gospel

Matthew chapter 11 verses 16 to 19

You can't have it both ways.

Our Lord is a master observer of people. He sees what they are doing and stores it up in his mind so that he can use it to highlight the message that he is putting across. Today he is using some of things that children do. They want to play together but not everybody will join in. They try different ways. One of the examples is the playing of pipes but nobody would dance. When they go to the other extreme of singing dirges they would not mourn.

We then have a reference to John the Baptist. Our Lord declared that there is no greater profit than the Baptist. People flocked to hear him. He was determined in his message giving. He spoke it as he saw it and didn't mind the consequences which meant prison and death. John lived a frugal life. He didn't eat or drink meaning he didn't sit at banquet tables. But for all this he was deemed to be possessed by a spirit.

On the other hand Jesus did eat and drink. But who did he eat and drink with? Tax-collectors and sinners. Yes tax-collectors and sinners. Not the hoppoloy but those who needed his help. He too spoke it as he saw it and didn't mind the consequences which meant arrest and death.

Both John and Jesus spoke the message but neither were accepted because they didn't fit the bill. It was easy to dismiss John. But Jesus, they couldn't fathom him out. Yes they rejected him but he kept coming back.

Rosary. Let us ask God to help us proclaim the Word to the people we meet by being ourselves who do their best to live out the Gospel message by what we do and say.

The Sick

Who are the sick? What is it that makes a person sick? The people in hospital are some of the sick. It doesn't matter why they are in hospital but some part of their body is not right and needs treatment. It is the whole person that needs treatment not just the particular symptom. People may have a mental problem which is not always easy to see or diagnose. Morale and general well-being may not be top notch. Lastly but not leastly is spiritual well-being. There is a vast array of things that can make us sick as well as over indulgence.

When we know that someone is sick we pray for them. We don't always broadcast across the parish because the sick person may want to keep it quiet. What do we pray for? How old is the person, what is the prognosis, what do they want the outcome to be? There is a whole plethera of considerations isn't there.

Jesus said that it is not the healthy who need the doctor but the sick. He came to cure us and he is with us continually carrying out that mission.

Gospel

Matthew chapter 17 verses 10 to 13

Did you recognise him?

If you have the time have a read of Isaiah chapter 48 verses 1 to 4 and 9 to 11. They fit so well with the gospel. Elijah was a prophet who had the God of Israel at the heart of everything he did and said. We read that he was taken up to heaven in a fiery chariot or a whirlwind of fire. The thought was that he was destined to return at a later date.

In the gospel our Lord agrees that Elijah has to come again. This second coming is to ensure that everything is just so. Our Lord says that Elijah has already come again but he wasn't recognised. Here there is an assumption that Jesus is referring to John the Baptist.

Advent gives us the time to reflect on all aspects of Jesus' coming again. We understand from scripture that he will come with his angels and he will be sitting on his throne of glory. Will there be a big fanfare, will a throng of angels announce his coming like they did at his first coming? Questions that have answers that are hidden from us. If we knew the answers how would we feel? How would we cope? Would we be like children who are impatient for Father Christmas to come? Would we be like a person waiting to undergo an operation, an interview or an examination? God is sparing us that by not letting us know the when, the where and the how. The \$64,000 question is 'Will we recognise him?'
